It's an exciting time for the team at Fire and Emergency New Zealand (FENZ). The Fire and Emergency Act 2017 brought together 40 different



organisations as a unified service. Combining different skill sets and learning from each other means that we're better together, and will continue to provide excellent service to communities across New Zealand.

The Act also broadened our mandate, so while our primary focus remains on the reduction of unwanted fires, we now work across four areas of emergency management, through a model known as the 4R's:

- Reduction of risk
- · Ensuring response **readiness**
- · Providing emergency **response**
- · Making coordinated efforts to facilitate **recovery** following an emergency.

Approximately one third of the callouts that our volunteers and career staff respond to are fatal and serious injury motor vehicle crashes. In New Zealand last year, 378 people died because of road trauma. Thousands more suffered physical, emotional and psychological injury. This unnecessary loss of life is an absolute tragedy. For those who survive but are severely injured, the effects are life changing, for them and their families, as well as impacting on the wider community.

As a nation, we can do better. Road safety is everyone's responsibility, which is why FENZ are now looking at innovative ways to engage with communities, schools, the business sector and local government to encourage and promote safe driving behaviour on our roads.

Some of the initiatives we are working on include partnering with Road Safety Education Ltd to deliver the RYDA programme, as well as supporting the work Students Against Dangerous Driving (SADD) do in secondary schools. We are also going to work collaboratively with the NZ Trucking Association on the Man Road Safety Truck which is a mobile road safety classroom.

And this is just the beginning ... South Canterbury Amateur Athletics Club



(SCAAC) is keen to expand its FUN base and bring an Athletics NZ (ANZ) programme to the Fairlie District.

Run Jump Throw is one of Athletics New Zealand's foundation programmes and forms the initial component of both the Athletics NZ Long Term Athlete development pathway, and their vision of 'All New Zealander's engaged in athletics'.

The SCAAC have been providing the *Run Jump Throw* programme to its 6-9 year-old members for the last 5 years. As part of the SCAAC involvement in the ANZ Club Development programme this initiative will bring the fundamental skills programme to more young athletes in the inland region.

Proposal:

- To run an 8 10 week fundamental skills athletics programme in Fairlie for 6-9 year olds.
- To commence the programme in the lead up to the Mackenzie Schools' Cluster athletics competition (21 Nov 2019) and the South Canterbury Primary Schools Athletics competition (3 December 2019)

Requirements:

- 4 or more local people to undertake training to facilitate the programme with one of these people being overall coordinator.
- A suitable green space out of school hours (with access to pre existing athletic facilities or equipment would be great) for an hour or so once a week
- Access to local communication networks to advertise for facilitators and promote the programme.
- Up to 30 keen 6-9 year old children.

SCAAC would provide:

- Training and support for the facilitators
- Equipment and resources for activities (stored locally)
- Opportunity for participants to become a Club member if they wish to go on to experience club competition at the All Weather Track in Timaru.

This locally run initiative could lead to:

- Improving local athlete's running, jumping and throwing skills across the athletics events spectrum that can also cross over to other sporting codes.
- Improving local athlete's knowledge and ability when undertaking school or club athletics competitions
- Improve local volunteer officials' knowledge and ability when undertaking athletics competitions
- Exposure to another choice of sport for locals
- Expanding the provision of the programme to other communities in the district (aspirational)
- Evaluation of demand/interest in establishing an athletics coordinator role serving the wider Mackenzie district (aspirational)



Health and Fitness

Mera Peak Nepal Trip - STEPHEN MCHAFFIE

I don't know how you condense the trip of a lifetime (so far!) into a page but here it goes. Last year Joe Rush and the team from Koru Mountains organised this trip to climb Mera Peak 6476m the world's highest trekking peak (not too technical but pretty high). They did a great job. Joe rounded up a team of us (suckers!) Chris Pudney, Nick Bell, Mick Guerin, Andrew Stevens, Simon Cooney, Jeff McCrostie, Ben Adams, myself and Sam Bell who was later scratched after being taken out by a mad calf in Temuka.

On 3rd of May we flew to Kathmandu, the town not the shop! We spent a day looking around, trying not to get run down by scooters. It's a full on and very interesting place. The next day we got out of town, in two overloaded jeeps with suspect tyres and drivers, it was a race but we got to Phaphlu, the end of road and start of the trek surprisingly in one piece!

On the 10 hour race, we saw a fair bit of countryside, it was a real eye-opener. There were paddocks being ploughed with water buffalo and brick factories with very little machinery, just manual labour. There were small farms everywhere even on the side of the mountains, growing spuds, corn and wheat. No one seems to have much, they have to work hard to make a living but they have smiles on their faces and have a lot of fun. They are great people; maybe money is not the answer to a happy life!

Anyway, we were at Phaphlu - the start of the trek. It was good to get the boots and pack on and start wandering around the Himalayas. I have always wanted to be there and it didn't disappoint. We had four Sherpas to guide us, the head sherpa's name was King Kong, he ran a good ship. Every night he would tell us what we were up to for the next day, we would check our blood oxygen levels and write down any health problems to keep an eye on altitude sickness. They were great guys, very professional and good fun. We also had six porters to carry most of our gear, we only had to carry less than 10 kg, they had 35+ kgs and sometimes they carried 50 kgs. Those blokes are tough; they carry it on their backs supported by a head strap (strong necks and legs).

We walked 160km or so in total, through rhododendron forests - seeing monkeys, donkeys, yaks, half-wild dogs that follow for a while until a bigger meaner one takes over. We also saw eagles, vultures, 4 Czech band members, marmots, musk deer, lots of different birds, one very rough looking German one. Andrew Stevens even saw a tiger one morning, far enough away that he didn't become its breakfast!

We walked 6-7 hours a day at a reasonably slow pace; usually up over a pass and sleeping lower to acclimatise preparing for when we got to it the big hill. It was interesting to find out how your body reacts up high, lots of heavy breathing, not much deep sleep and a real lack of horsepower! We camped up in the snow on the eve of summit day, got up 1 am and had porridge for breakfast, threw our boots/crampons on and roped into groups of 4.

Mera Peak has a big snowfield up the back with the odd crevasse running through, hence the roping up. We got up the top just as the sun rose. It was the perfect day, a bit cold at minus 22 but good once the sun hit. There in front of us was the best view I have ever seen - 5 of the 6 highest mountains in the world. What a site and we had earned it! We couldn't see all the mad buggers lining up on Everest as it was too far away (50km), but it seemed pretty close. Then we started our way down to Lukla, the airport Sir Ed helped build, not bad to fly out of but not good to fly into!

The last night of the trek we stayed at Kings farm, below Lukla and had one hell of a party. We had been bitten by the local grog (raksi) before when we visited one of the Sherpa's parents on day 3 of the trek, but we still didn't learn. It was a great party, dancing around with the porters and sherpas to our music, complete with Mike Guerin breakdancing to thunderstruck (very impressive) and their music, Bollywood style. We flew back to Kathmandu, then home after 2 days sightseeing around the town. All in all it was a hell of a trip - thanks to Joe and the Koru Mountains team. If anyone's keen on going on a trip in the future, I thoroughly recommend it. Nick Bell, the techno kid, has a good video of the trip on www.korumountains.co.nz if you are interested!

Can I ask if any of your readers can recall back in the 50s/60s these fire fighting implements which I think were called stirrup pumps, maybe some still have one in their home.

As a boy I recall one of these pumps sitting at the back door of our home in Aorangi Crescent, Tekapo as I think there was one at



every ones back door or laundry back then in the Hydro village.

Again as a boy, I had great delight in playing with this apparatus but my father would put it rather bluntly that if I used it and did not refill it there would be consequences to follow, a size 9 boot was somewhere in there.

I have roughly sketched out the pump, which no doubt today's fire extinguishers have taken their place but these were very handy in their day. It would be interesting to see if any are still being used for the purpose they were intended for.

NZ Police have launched 105 (pronounced "ten five"), its new telephone number to report non-emergencies to the police. In addition to the number, the police also launched an online 105.police.govt.nz, giving people a further option to seek non-emergency help, advice and support. The 105 number will be answered 24/7 by trained police staff. It is free to call from all landline and mobile numbers.

Police Commissioner Mike Bush said "We want people to use 105 to report non-emergency situations. For example, if your car has been stolen, your property has been damaged, or you want to give police information about crime in your area - use 105. On the other hand, 111 should still be called immediately if a crime is taking place, or if there is a threat to life or property. It is the number you use to connect with police, fire and emergency and the ambulance services."

WHY ARE KIDS IMPATIENT, BORED, FRIENDLESS, AND ENTITLED?

Some simple ideas to help with parenting!
"Kids today are in a devastating emotional state! Most come to school emotionally unavailable for learning. There are many factors in our modern lifestyle that contribute to this." ~V.P.

KIDS and TECHNOLOGY

Using technology as a "Free babysitting service" is, in fact, not free at all. The payment is waiting for you just around the corner. We pay with our kids' nervous systems, with their attention, and with their ability for delayed gratification.

Compared to virtual reality, everyday life is boring. When kids come to the classroom, they are exposed to human voices and adequate visual stimulation as opposed to being bombarded with the graphic explosions and special effects that they are used to seeing on the screens. After hours of virtual reality, processing information in a classroom becomes increasingly challenging for our kids

because their brains are getting used to the high levels of stimulation that video games provide. The inability to process lower levels of stimulation leaves kids vulnerable to academic challenges. Technology also disconnects us emotionally from our children and our families. Parental emotional availability is the main nutrient for child's brain. Unfortunately, we are gradually depriving our children of that nutrient.

TRAIN THEIR BRAIN

You can make a difference in your child's life by training your child's brain so that your child will successfully function on social, emotional, and academic levels. Here is how:

LIMIT TECHNOLOGY, AND RE-CONNECT WITH YOUR KIDS EMOTIONALLY

Surprise them with flowers, share a smile, tickle them, put a love note in their backpack or under their pillow, surprise them by taking them out for lunch on a school day, dance together, crawl together, have pillow fights. Have family dinners, board game nights, go biking, go to outdoor walks with a flashlight in the evening and seek out the stars..

Make A Difference Through Single-Use Product Reduction - Recycling Isn't Enough

Every single day, people throw away single-use products and contaminate the earth, along with the oceans. Only you can know how much of that pollution is coming from your own doorstep. You might think you're living sustainably because you've stopped using plastic bags.

BREAD TAGS for wheelchairs

If you recycle, you probably think you're doing everything you can for our environment. But, recycling will never fix the situation. What we need is reform. We need to find ways to drastically reduce the amount of single-use products that wind up in our landfills, and the only way to do that is to start being conscious of everything we discard day after day, in both the red and yellow bins. While this might sound like a harsh reality, it's actually quite positive. Living completely plastic free is hard to do, and might not be achievable for the average family. But, if you can reduce your use of single-use items, you *CAN* make a difference. Not only will you be ditching disposable items for longlasting quality products help protect the environment, it will also save you money.

Bread Tags – Heartlands Fairlie Resource Centre is officially a

collection point for bread tags. Bread Tags for Wheelchairs has been running in South Africa since 2006, collecting bread tags which a plastics company, Zibo, buys for a small amount per kilo. The tags (high impact polystyrene, type 6 plastic) are recycled, being made into seedling trays. The proceeds are used to provide wheelchairs for the needy. At present about 500kg are collected per month in South Africa, funding 2-3 wheelchairs.

People who were aware of this programme had been collecting tags for this cause in New Zealand for many years and either taking them to South Africa when they visited or posting them. In February 2019, a New Zealand arm of Bread Tags for Wheelchairs was set up, in order to promote the programme, increase collection, look into local recycling and streamline the transport of the tags. Our aim is to have all NZ bread tags recycled here, with just the funds remitted to South Africa to buy wheelchairs.

Ration Challenge 2019

I first found out about the Ration Challenge last year after a friend of mine was participating in it. After seeing footage on tv, my heart was aching for their plight. I really wanted to do something to help refugees, even if it were something small in my little



part of the world. The Ration Challenge is essentially eating a ration pack that would be similar to what refugees are provided with in refugee camps. The idea is to raise money and awareness with money raised going back into the camps providing food, education and medicine. The focus currently is helping Syrian refugees.

The packs ensure you are not hungry with 425g rice, 170g lentils, 85g chickpeas, 250ml cooking oil, small tin of sardines and 400g kidney beans. A further 1.5kg of rice and a small amount of flour. The challenge encourages those participating to earn food rewards once they meet thresholds. This is meant to mimic those in refugee camps who trade their goods or find ways to make money within the camps. I was well supported raising over \$2,300 and was able to drink weak tea and eat some extra protein in the form of two eggs among other rewards.

It is certainly a challenge participating as we are so used to convenience and a range of food choices, however the benefits from taking part are numerous. You develop a deep sense of empathy, and a reflection on your own life. There are so many things I take for granted and this challenge makes you appreciate them. I live in a safe country, with my family and friends around me in my comfortable home. Not only was it a spiritual and emotional journey, but also a physical one. It is a high carb, low protein/fruit/veg/dairy diet which plays havoc with the body both during and after the challenge. What gets you through is knowing that this is only for a week. Some refugees are in camps for over a year!

SCAMS ARE IN EPIDEMIC PROPORTION CRIME AND JUSTICE

Members of the public, especially the vulnerable and the elderly, have again been warned by police to be wary of scammers claiming to work for telecommunications organisations or police.

It comes after several victims were contacted this week by scammers claiming to be part of the police cybercrime unit or a telecommunications company, police said.

In one incident, the victim was contacted by a duplicate Facebook account of someone known to them. The scammers then requested the victim's bank details. Police are advising the public not to engage with anyone on the phone and to hang up immediately if they believe they are being scammed.

"While most people will not respond to these scams, others are more vulnerable," Detective Senior Sergeant Greg Brand said in a statement. "We urge you to have conversations with vulnerable or elderly family members to help ensure they are aware of the tactics often used by scammers. "Please remember that government agencies will never contact you out of the blue and ask for bank details."

Anyone who believes they are a victim of a scam are advised to contact police. Further advice on scam prevention can be found on the NZ police website.





The following book which will be of interest to many in this area was reviewed online by Karen Waters.



The Billion Dollar Bonfire: How Allan Hubbard and the government destroyed South Canterbury Finance by Chris Lee Reviewed by Karen Waters

If you have any interest in the SC Finance collapse, the personalities involved, especially Allan Hubbard, or the workings of the capital markets industry, you should read this book.

It is not light reading but it is informative and thoroughly researched. To be honest, I sometimes found the level of detail burdensome and I struggled at times to assimilate all the information, especially at night when I start to have major brain fade. But it is fascinating! The things that went on defy belief - the machinations of the principal players, the flaws in our financial system, the flaws in the people running it - greed, arrogance, ignorance - it is all there, including a warning that it could all happen again. The heavy, and sometimes intellectually challenging material in the book, is made more palatable with stories that illustrate what the author is talking about. However, the most fascinating stuff for me was the insights into the man at the centre of the perfect storm that saw the implosion of SCF – Allan Hubbard. The author does not demonise the man – but neither does he buy into the popular local narrative that Hubbard was a business genius and benefactor who would never let his followers down. Am I recommending this book? Yes, emphatically. Is it for the faint-hearted? Well, it isn't fluffy stuff so you have been warned. Could you skim over the financial nitty gritty material if that isn't your cup of tea, and still enjoy it? Absolutely – there is enough meat in the book for anyone with an interest in the SCF story to have a pick. I am giving it 4 debenture certificates out of 5!

From the Mayor's Office ...

We have passed the shortest day and what an easy winter it has been to date. Farmers are getting very good utilisation out of fodder crops with no wastage.

Ski fields still need more snow but Round Hill opened this weekend and Dobson is opening next week. This year marks 40 years since the Foote family developed this field.

We are very lucky to have so much opportunity here in the Mackenzie and this was further highlighted to me last week as Mackenzie District Council hosted a Dark Sky Forum. There were 15 councils from all around NZ represented as we showcased, with our board, our Gold Star Dark Sky Reserve. You all can be so proud of what has been achieved in the protection and management of our dark sky. We are the envy of many councils and I believe we lead NZ. Over 20 businesses feed into the distinction of our Mackenzie Dark Sky and this is growing. Earth and Sky's new astronomy centre in Tekapo opens next week and is a must to see. I think you will be amazed and I wish them well.

This week Council unanimously adopted our Annual Plan 2019/20. No consultation was needed as we do not have any significant variances from our consulted Long Term Plan adopted last year. Expenditure and income remain as projected.

Our rates increase which was signalled last year, is on track at 7.57%. Interesting to note that last year Mackenzie had the lowest residential rates in NZ.

Our Provincial Growth Fund's successful application for a 30-year feasibility study for understanding growth in Mackenzie, sustainable and vibrant communities, developing infrastructure, including roading and parking, transportation, managing our environment and farming. It is going to be a very important reference document going forward.

I hope to have this work completed by year's end and you will all have the opportunity to have some input into this.

Staff Organisation Review which has been Councils priority this year, is nearly complete. I and my councillors are confident we now have an enabling council fit for purpose and believe that we can deliver and manage the future exciting opportunities and challenges that lie ahead of us.




